Good Morning

Thank you for letting me present at your Meeting.

Firstly I would like to praise the article about dog registration in the June First Edition. It is good to see the 'Governments Code of Welfare for dogs'. Also just like to praise the signs at Riverton regarding dog control especially the one which is a dogs on leash sign and says about infringements.

Unfortunately I have seen a few dogs that are not being kept on leads where they should be in the Riverton; Nightcaps; Okaitau and Winton areas. Also seen a few dogs in the No Dogs area of Hobt Park and Okaitau there have been 2 wandering dogs in Nightcaps during July & a dog in the Playground at Memorial Park in Nightcaps. I would like to suggest more patrols in these areas and including Lumsden because I saw a dog in the Playground there also (in July).

I sent around my new Petition yesterday about 'Fairer customer complaint follow up and compassion from Local Councils'.

It is important to acknowledge that complaints are individually relevant and

that the dog Control Act 'Obligations of dog owners' are looked at relevant to an individual's circumstance. This is fair. In particular I would like to mention Barking. Over the last 4 years 2016 - 2019 (from SDC council reports) there have been a total of ~~15~~ 653 barking complaints. I would like to read you this statement from a person who has concerns about barking issues like myself.

To whom it may concern

I agree with Wendy Baker in regards to dogs barking at people while they are on their own property, or out and about enjoying their lives.

Not only is dog barking annoying it is also stressful for people & the dogs. If the dog is so unhappy that they bark to the point of being a nuisance to others. It is my belief that the dog is stressed & clearly voicing their unhappiness. Therefore the owner of the dog needs educating on how to care for their dog. It is not unreasonable for peace & comfort for all animals & people.

Councils should understand an individual's circumstance. And care more. People should not be harassed by dogs or their owners.


If you choose to own a dog you then become responsible for having control over the animal & a duty to deal with any issues that may come up along the way.

It's a sad day for New Zealand when councils don't take these matters seriously.

It is important that Councils take all dog control issues seriously and formally educate dog owners on their obligations under the Dog Control Act 1996.

Regarding dog bite injuries I sent around information from ACC yesterday. There are still high numbers - thousands - of dog bite injuries happening in NZ as you will have seen.

You will see that my Petition 'Make NZ a safer country regarding dog control' got presented to Parliament last year and I was asked to make a submission which is on the Parliament website this year.

I care about seeing a better NZ overall regarding dog control. Yesterday I also sent around a copy of a letter from ACC which says that local councils are responsible for enforcing the Dog Control Act 1996. There is also a letter from the Minister for Local Government which says about councils 'respond to complaints & enforce dog owner responsibility'.

Over the last few years 2016 - 2019 SDC's reports show that there were 182 dog attacks in Southland.

So, you can see that I am still very active in caring about dog issues.

As stated before I would like to suggest that SDC assess complaints on an individual basis and apply Dog owner obligations in a fair way otherwise a person has the right to contact the ombudsman - which I may have to do (again). People have the right to enjoy their life & not be distressed by dog

Preparing for the meeting

Talk to the governance team if you are going to:

- make a PowerPoint presentation (these need to be emailed to the governance team by 4pm on the working day before the meeting)

At the meeting

Sit in the public gallery and wait for the meeting to start. The Committee Advisor will be in the meeting room 10 minutes before the meeting begins and will:

- register those who have approval to present / speak to the meeting
- take any handouts you've brought with you and distribute them
- answer your questions.

The chair may begin the meeting by running through some housekeeping matters before calling you forward.

Making your presentation

When it is your turn to speak, the chair will formally introduce you and invite you to move to the place from where you will address the meeting.

Restrictions on speaking at meetings

There are provisions in standing orders 15.2 (Public Forums) and 16.2 (Deputations) for restricting speaking at meetings. (<https://www.southlanddc.govt.nz/assets/My-Council/2019-Southland-District-Council-Standing-Orders.pdf>)

These standing orders direct that the chair has discretion to decline to hear a speaker or terminate a presentation at any time where:

- the speaker is repeating views presented by an earlier speaker at the same public forum
- the speaker is criticising elected members and/or staff
- the speaker is being repetitious, disrespectful or offensive
- the speaker has previously spoken on the same issue
- the matter is subject to legal proceedings; and
- the matter is subject to a hearing, including the hearing of submissions where the local authority or committee sits in a quasi-judicial capacity.

Speaking time

Standing orders places a limit of **five minutes** on any individual speaker addressing a meeting, and **10 minutes** on an organisation who may have no more than two people speak on its behalf.

Use your speaking time effectively. If there is time left at the end of your presentation, the chair will facilitate any questions from the councillors. Questions will be confined to obtaining information or clarification about matters raised by a speaker.

After the meeting

Anything distributed or tabled at the meeting will become part of the public record for the meeting and will be:

- made available with the minutes (including your name)
- put up on the Southland District Council website.

Petition of Wendy Baker

I refer to your letter dated 30 June 2020, addressed to ACC's Chief Executive, about the petition of Wendy Baker regarding dog control. You have requested an update on what work is being done by ACC to reduce dog attacks.

ACC's injury prevention programmes

ACC prioritises its investment in injury prevention programmes, both locally and nationally, in accordance with its injury prevention strategy. The strategy focuses on seven major areas of injury liability and impact to the scheme: injuries sustained as a result of falls; treatment injury; sport; violence; injuries on the road and injuries in the community or workplace.

ACC does not issue any specific advice to people around minimising the risk of dog-related injuries as this role is best placed with other government agencies and advocacy groups. For example, local councils are responsible for enforcing the Dog Control Act 1996.

Government work to reduce dog attack injuries

On 22 September 2016, the previous Government announced a new national action plan to reduce the risk and harm of dog attacks. As a result of the plan, there were several legislative changes made to the Dog Control Act 1996. For more information regarding the actions taken in relation to this plan, I refer you to the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA) website here: <https://www.dia.govt.nz/Resource-material-Dog-Control-2016-Review-of-Dog-Control-Regime#one>.

ACC regularly provides DIA with dog-related claims data to support their work around community dog safety education and control. For more information regarding DIA's work on dog control, I refer you back to the DIA website here: <https://www.dia.govt.nz/Resource-material-Dog-Control-Index#two>.

Thank you for your emails about matters to do with dog control. I read the materials you provided with great interest, and note that you have suffered from the effects of a dog attack. I hope you have made a full recovery. Also, congratulations on your success at the World Masters Games 2017.

Dog control is a complex issue, which requires balancing the rights and responsibilities of dog owners with the public's right to safety. Councils already have a wide range of powers to respond to complaints and enforce dog owner responsibilities: owners can be fined or prosecuted if their dogs are not adequately controlled or if their dog attacks a person, animal or protected wildlife.

Thank you for your email to Hon Louise Upston of 22 February 2017. I am responding as the issues you raise relate to my portfolio responsibilities as the recently appointed Associate Minister for Local Government.

You wrote about your experiences with dog control and the Southland District Council. I was interested to read about your efforts to improve dog safety in your region. It is clear you care a lot about your community and its safety.

I am continuing work on the national action plan to reduce the risk and harm of dog attacks, which was announced in late 2016. As you may know, public education on dog safety is a key part of this plan. The Government will be working with local government and non-government organisations to develop a campaign that educates dog owners about being socially responsible and teaches all New Zealanders how to keep ourselves and our children safe around dogs.

The Government will also be working with local government to review and improve guidance for councils on best practice in dog control. I expect the improved guidance will include up-to-date information for councils and animal control officers about the use of the enforcement tools councils have available to them. I am encouraging councils to share information and insights, about dog control with each other, for the benefit of their communities.

I encourage you and anyone else who sees owners and dogs not complying with local dog bylaws to contact the Council with your concerns.

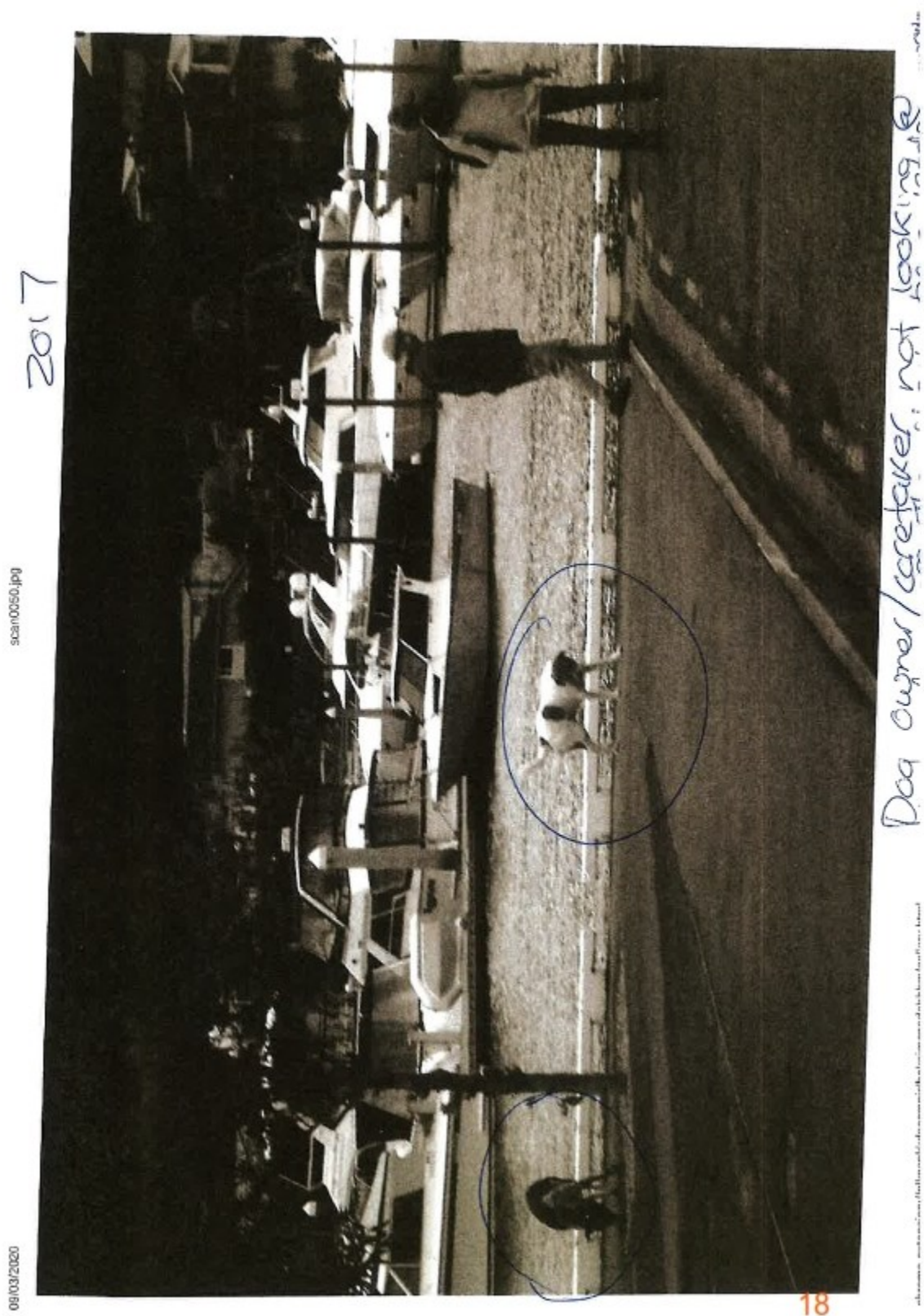

A Tauranga woman is on a mission to improve dog control in New Zealand.

Wendy Baker has raised a petition to parliament requesting the government take serious action to reduce dog attacks.

She's been advocating for dog control since 2009.

"I've been concerned and campaigning for a better New Zealand as far as dog control is concerned since 2009.

"I consider myself to be an advocate for better dog control in New Zealand."

Wendy says there are too many dog bite injuries in New Zealand every year.

In 2018, ACC statistics show there were 13,954 claims related to dog bites and 14,654 in 2017.

"Every year there are thousands of dog bite injury claims. My petition asks that the government initiates a national education campaign regarding responsible and safe dog control."

Plea to respect dog rules

Waihi Beach residents are delivering the message to dog owners: Control your pet in public places.

Dogs are prohibited in the scenic reserve of Orokawa and Homunga Bay, a DOC sign at the north end of the beach says.

The sign was installed last September but locals say many disregard it. Waihi Beach resident Ian Robinson says seeing dogs in the scenic reserve is no surprise to him.

"In the Orokawa Reserve they are in there all the time. I have not been there very often lately but I remember that it is not unusual to see a dog around the corner, 20m ahead of the owners."

"It is a walkway for the public, not for dogs. Why do I have to put up with dogs?" he says.

The DOC sign was installed after former resident Wendy Baker pointed out the issue to the Department of Conservation.

"Orokawa Reserve is a no-dog zone by law," she says.

There were 4720 dogs registered in the whole Western Bay district between June 30 2016-17, and 170 classified as menacing — breeds and behaviours.

Twenty-two attacks on people were reported districtwide in 2016-17.

Wendy, who is a keen runner, was attacked by a loose dog while exercising in a reserve a few years back.

She has started a battle to educate dog owners.

"I encourage owners to be more responsible and considerate by running their dogs in the allocated areas and keeping them under control, on the leash."

In 10 years, the number of ACC claims on dog-related injuries in recreational and sports places has nearly doubled nationwide, from 533 in 2007 to 949 in 2016.

But most injuries are "minor" — an ACC



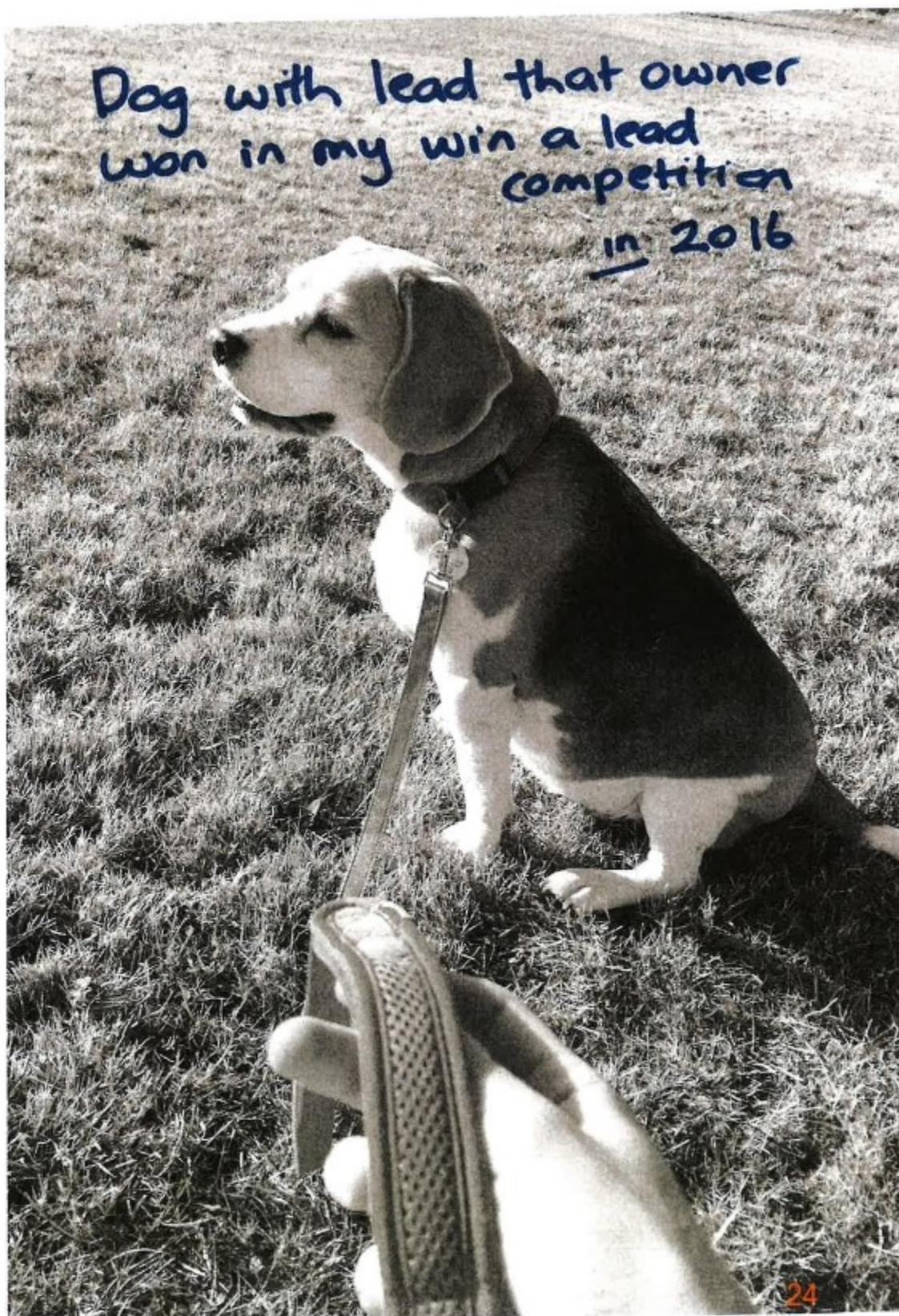

she says. The council reviewed its 2011 Dog Control Bylaw and Policy tightening the rules for dog owners, two years ago. Dogs must be kept on leash in the Waihi Beach village (Wilson Rd) and in the Island View reserve between October and March due to birds nesting. They are prohibited along the whole beach in summer between 9am to 7pm, from the third Wednesday of December to February 7 included.

Dogs are also banned from all the scenic reserves and playgrounds. Council has allocated a year-round dog exercise area in town, between Alhacore Ave and Plum Rd (stretch of beach between Waihi Beach and Bowentown). Ian knows dog control is an emotional topic to owners but asks them to respect the rules.

"Nearly every morning, I see dogs on the loose. It does not matter where you go at Waihi Beach. I see them running around, pooping here or there and they [owners] take no notice. Fines up to \$20,000 and infringement notices of \$300 can be issued for breaching the bylaw and policy in Western Bay."

Dog control in New Zealand

Thank you for your letter dated 14 August 2017 to Colin MacDonald, Chief Executive Department Internal Affairs, regarding dog control in New Zealand.



I understand your concerns about the unacceptable number of dog attacks in New Zealand.

As you are aware, the rising number of dog attacks was the catalyst for the Government's launch of the national strategy to reduce the risk and harm of dog attacks in 2016. As part of the strategy, a bill amending the Dog Control Act 1996 (the Act) is expected to be introduced in the next parliamentary term. I encourage you to submit on the bill when it is considered by a select committee.

As you noted, territorial authorities send their annual reports under section 10A of the Act to Colin MacDonald as the Secretary of Local Government. Councils also typically make these reports available to communities to improve the transparency of local dog control policies and enforcement. This is consistent with the accountability of councils to their communities under the Local Government Act 2002.

Territorial authorities vary in the level of detail they include in their section 10A reports. If you have concerns about a territorial authority's approach to reporting, or the conduct of council staff, I suggest you contact that council directly. However, bear in mind that the reports are most effectively used to identify trends within individual councils and communities over different years, rather than to compare the performance of different councils.

Regarding the council reviews of dog control bylaws, I note that the timing for reviews is established under the Local Government Act 2002, and is in line with the timing for reviews of bylaws generally. Ten years is the maximum period a council can go without reviewing their bylaw. Councils can review their bylaw earlier if they consider there is a need to do so, including any change in their local circumstances.

Southland District Council is required to publicly report each financial year on the administration of its Dog Control Policy and its dog control practices.

What we do

This activity provides for the control of dogs to protect the public, and promotes responsible dog ownership. The activity involves registering dogs, investigating complaints about dogs, education, monitoring and enforcement.

Why we do it

Dog control contributes to creating safe places (homes, public places and roads), the abatement of nuisances from dogs, and the protection of protected wildlife. Council is required to comply with the legal requirements of the Dog Control Act 1996 and the Impounding Act 1955.

Dog Control in the Southland District

Southland District Council covers a large geographical area, which includes both urban and rural dog owners.

In order to deliver an animal control service, Council has an animal control unit consisting of:

- a manager
- a full time dog control officer
- a 0.8 full time equivalent dog control officer
- two casual dog rangers (both vacant as at time of writing)
- an afterhours contractor (Armourguard)
- a shared service with Invercargill City Council

The animal control unit has a close working relationship with key stakeholders in the community such as the Society for the Protection of Animals (SPCA), Furever Homes, local veterinarians, Police and other local authorities.

The animal control unit operates a seven day, 24 hour service.

Staff believe that resourcing is currently adequate to fulfil its statutory duties. A quality management officer has been employed by Council to assist with the development of a quality system across Environmental Services.

Commentary on statistical information

Some commentary on the statistical information in Appendix 1 is as follows:

Wandering dogs:

There has been a reduction in wandering dog complaints, continuing the downwards trend. Dog control officers advise that there has been an improvement in dog containment, with fewer wandering dogs being observed than several years ago.

Infringement notices:

Officers are issuing more infringements in accordance with Council's direction of shifting compliance costs relating to irresponsible ownership to owners that have offended under the Dog Control Act.

Attacks/rushing:

There has been a decrease in the number of rushing/attack incidents, as there was the year before that as well. This may be related to observations of less wandering dogs - that is, dogs are being better contained, and this is a factor that is directly related to rushing/attack incidents.

Working smarter

A large focus has been increasing the number of dogs that are registered using "Payit" on Council's website. Work included developing the new dogs' online registration, use of bulk emails to our dog owners, introducing dog changes system on our website, an improved communications campaign, and adding an iPad as an incentive to register online. All these initiatives have proven successful with more dogs being registered online.

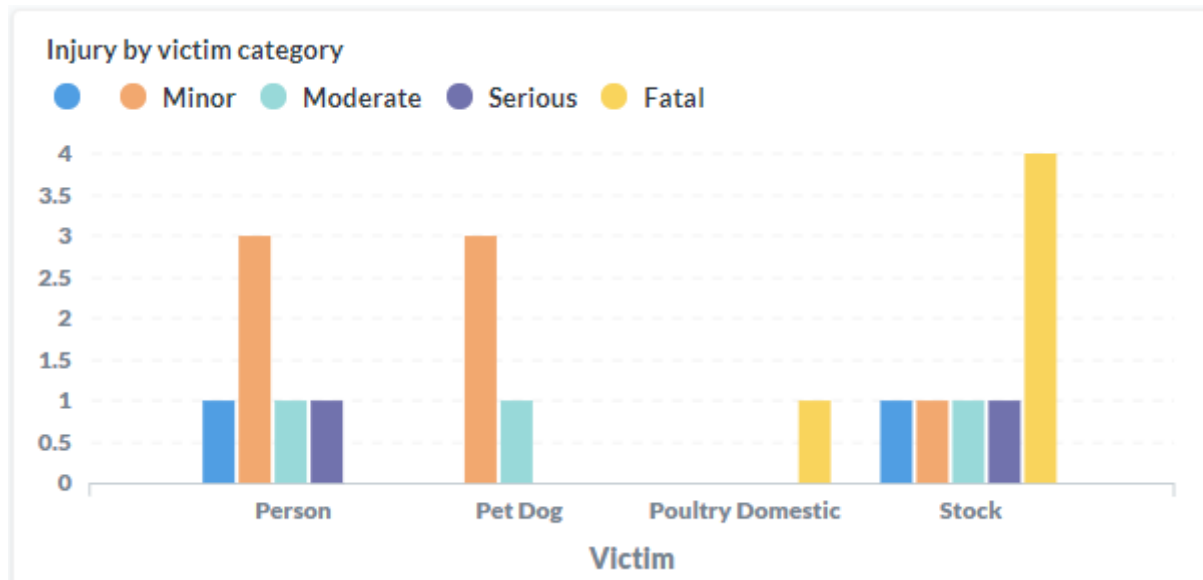
Along with a strong focus on encouraging dog owners to register online, another focus this year is ensuring that new dogs are classed correctly first time; for example ensuring working dogs meet the legal definition of working dogs.

A summary of some of the changes from last year:

- New dog registrations can now be completed online, and so all dog registrations, including changes, can be completed online
- Dog registration forms will now be emailed to dog owners, to those that have email addresses. The remainder will be posted as normal.
- Incentivising online registrations by:
 - Increasing the prize draw to three iPads from one last year, an twenty \$50 prezzy cards replacing the twenty free registrations last year
 - Part of Council's communications campaign (Facebook, flyer that accompanies registration forms, posters, the forms, newspaper ads, First Edition, the Southland App, radio ads)
 - Printing a message to promote online registration on envelopes

Attacks

A questionnaire has been added to Council's systems to drill down into the circumstances behind dog attacks. The following bar graph summarises injury by victim category:



Three years ago a common type of dog attack incident was a dog escaping its property and attacking a dog/person walking by. This has largely been eliminated, reasons may include proactive work by officers, and the impact of the new discounts that promote containment.

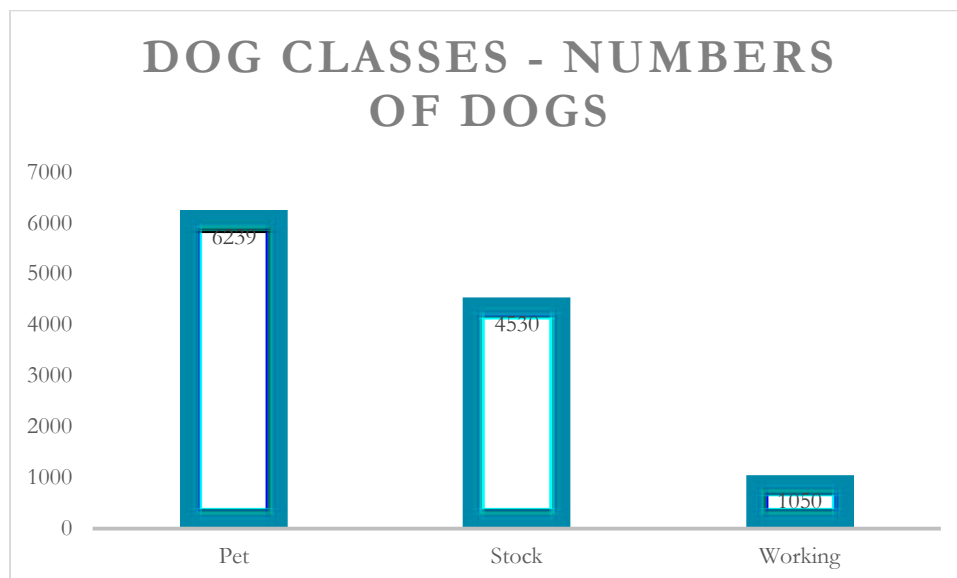
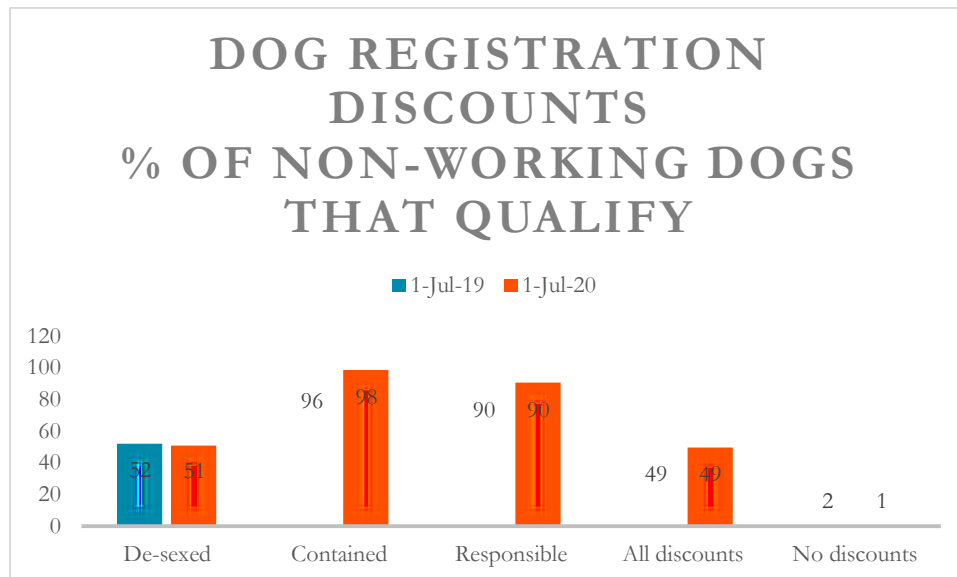
The serious attack on a person involved a child being bitten on the face, while at home. The child approached the dog, owned by a worker on site, while it was tied up. The dog was destroyed and no further action taken.

Due to a systems limitation that cannot be resolved at the time of writing:

- The blue bar above for “Person”, related to an attack where the dog could not be identified, and the Dog Control Officer was not able to contact the victim, however Mr Fairbairn is of the view that the attack was of a minor nature.
- The blue bar above for “Stock”, related to an attack where the dog could not be identified, however Mr Fairbairn advises that the attack was in the “Fatal” category.

Dog registration fee discounts / classes

The number of non-working dogs that qualified for the discounts is shown in the graph below, and the number of dogs per class, are represented in the following graphs:

Dog Education

Dog education is achieved in a number of ways, including during registration process, patrols, site visits, articles and Facebook. The unit also places promotional material in Council's First Edition which is sent quarterly to all ratepayers in the Southland District Council area.

Collaboration

The team hosted the second interagency meeting for animal control/welfare agencies in November. Attendees included the local Councils, NZTA, some vets, DOC, Furever Homes and Environment Southland. Items for discussion included the possible promotion of www.lostpet.co.nz among the relevant agencies, shared dog education programme, and a roles document clarifying how general public enquiries should be directed.

Council shares services with Invercargill City Council:

1. Council has warranted three ICC animal control officers and can draw on their services when the demand arises.
2. Council operates a combined dog control facility with ICC. Five of the 28 kennels are dedicated for use by Council. Council has an exclusive licence to occupy five kennels signed in 2012, with the licence to have a life of 50 years with a right of renewal. SDC paid a one-off capital contribution and has an arrangement for paying for ongoing expenses and a daily tariff for each kennel when in use by SDC.

Free microchipping

Council continues to offer free microchipping for dogs registered with it.

Observations from the dog control Officers

As noted in last year's report, there is a continuing trend of a decreasing number dogs that require a catch pole to secure them.

The officers believe that there is more reporting of issues, meaning that potential problems are being prevented by proactive action. They believe that there is increasing confidence in reporting issues due to confidence in a responsive service.

Less wandering and attacks is believed in part due to effective wandering education/responses, and also the containment discount in fees/charges. Dog control also has very good presence with dog control vehicles, and media releases.

While patrolling there are less dogs seen wandering and most dogs are being walked are on lead.

Last year the officers raised a concern of dogs off-lead on the Winton walking track and in the on-lead areas at Riverton beach. Over the last year, this has improved considerably.

The number of dogs being microchipped is steadily increasing, following the introduction of the discounts.

Purpose

- 1 The purpose of the report is to provide a summary of the key recommendations from the Resource Management Act Reform Report prepared by the Resource Management Review Panel, commonly referred to as the 'Randerson Report'.

Background

- 2 On 1 July 2019 Cabinet agreed to undertake a comprehensive review of the Resource Management Act 1991 (RMA).
- 3 The key drivers for the review were:
- New Zealand's natural environment is under significant pressure.
 - Urban areas are struggling to keep pace with population growth.
 - An urgent need to reduce carbon emissions and adapt to climate change.
 - The need to ensure that Māori have an effective role in the system, consistent with the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi, and;
 - The need to improve system efficiency and effectiveness.
- 4 The overall purpose of the review of the RMA was to improve environmental outcomes and better enable urban and other development within environmental limits.
- 5 A Resource Management Review Panel was appointed, by the Minister for the Environment, to review primarily the RMA, but to also review the relationship between the RMA and the Local Government Act (LGA), the Land Transport Management Act (LTMA) and the Climate Change Response Act (CCRA). The Panel was chaired by the Hon Tony Randerson QC.
- 6 In June 2020, the review panel published a report titled 'New Directions For Resource Management in New Zealand', which is now commonly referred to as the 'Randerson Report'.

- 8 Whilst the Randerson Report is a review of the RMA only, and does not form part of any formal legislative changes, it is widely considered that it will significantly shape the environmental outcomes managed through the RMA and the institutional framework for how environmental outcomes are managed in the future.

Key recommendations from Randerson Report

- 9 The Review Panel recommended the RMA should be repealed and replaced with two new pieces of legislation. A third piece of complimentary legislation is also recommended. See Attachment A which illustrates the proposed environmental management system and how the three pieces of legislation would be applied:
- **Natural and Built Environments Act** which focuses on enhancing the quality of both these environments to support the wellbeing of present and future generations.
 - **Strategic Planning Act** which integrates social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing through integration of environmental management, land use and infrastructure.
 - **Managed Retreat and Climate Change Adaptation Act** which specifically relates to managed retreat and adaptation where it is required for climate change and to reduce the risks resulting from natural hazards.
- 10 See Attachment B which illustrates the change in focus and effort under the Natural and Built Environments Act.
- 11 The following is a summary of the key themes proposed by the Review Panel. These proposals will potentially change how SDC undertakes planning related business:
- The use of specified outcomes, targets and limits as goal measures. A shift away from the current resource consent effects based decision making, to having plans direct the overarching desired outcome.
 - There would be mandatory national direction, set by the Minister for the Environment, which would guide Councils planning systems and processes.
 - Improved recognition of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and te ao Māori and the integration of iwi in decision making. The new legislation is to focus on enhancing the quality of the environment and recognise the concept of Te Mana o te Taiao.
 - Long term strategic and integrated planning for resource management and infrastructure.
 - Simplified and integrated regulatory plans, that are clearer, more directive and responsive through improved planning processes.
 - Improved consent processes with a clearer differentiation between activities with significant and minor effects.
 - Resource allocation guided by principles of sustainability, equity and efficiency (not first in first served).
 - A wider use of economic instruments eg permit trading and environmental taxes alongside environmental regulation.
 - Establishment of a nationally coordinated environmental monitoring system. An increased auditing role to be undertaken by the Ministry for the Environment within respect to the plan making component.

- Partnership across central, local government and mana whenua.
- Clarity in respect to the roles of regional and territorial authorities. The Regional Council would be responsible for regional significance identification and policy. Policies which would control the use of water, air, the Coastal Marine Area, flood protection, the maintenance of biodiversity. The Regional Council would be supporting the Territorial Authority in respect of land use controls to implement the policies.
- Territorial Authorities, would be responsible for setting policies on matters of district significance to achieve the purpose of the act(s) and to promote integrated management. The Territorial Authority would be setting policies for the control of land use to include urban and rural land, subdivision, noise, contaminated land, hazardous substances and heritage.
- Jointly, the Regional Council and the Territorial Authority would set policies to address hazardous substances, climate change and urban growth capacity, soil conservation, natural environment outcomes and Tikanga Māori outcomes that would be identified in the new legislation.
- There would be a combined Regional Policy Statement, Regional Plan(s), and District Plan to be prepared and notified by a joint committee. The committee would have the authority to make the decisions. See Attachment C for a proposed map of regions for combined planning.
- The system as a whole is efficient and proportionate.
- The powers of Territorial Authorities should be extended to enable them to modify or extinguish existing land uses and land use consents in specific circumstances eg to accommodate for climate change.

- 12 As stated above, the Randerson Report is a review of the RMA only, and does not form part of any formal legislative changes. Cabinet is responsible for making all the decisions around the progress of the report and recommendations. Cabinet has indicated that a broad, open process of public consultation will follow its considerations of the proposals outlined in the report. This will involve wide engagement with stakeholders and beyond prior to the introduction of any new legislation.

The Review Panel was asked to review the relationship between the RMA, the Local Government Act (LGA), the Land Transport Management Act (LTMA) and the Climate Change Response Act (CCRA). See Attachment D for a summary of how all these pieces of legislation would interrelate together. Overall, it requires a strategic, holistic approach to plan development ie no one plan can sit in isolation from another.

Recommendation

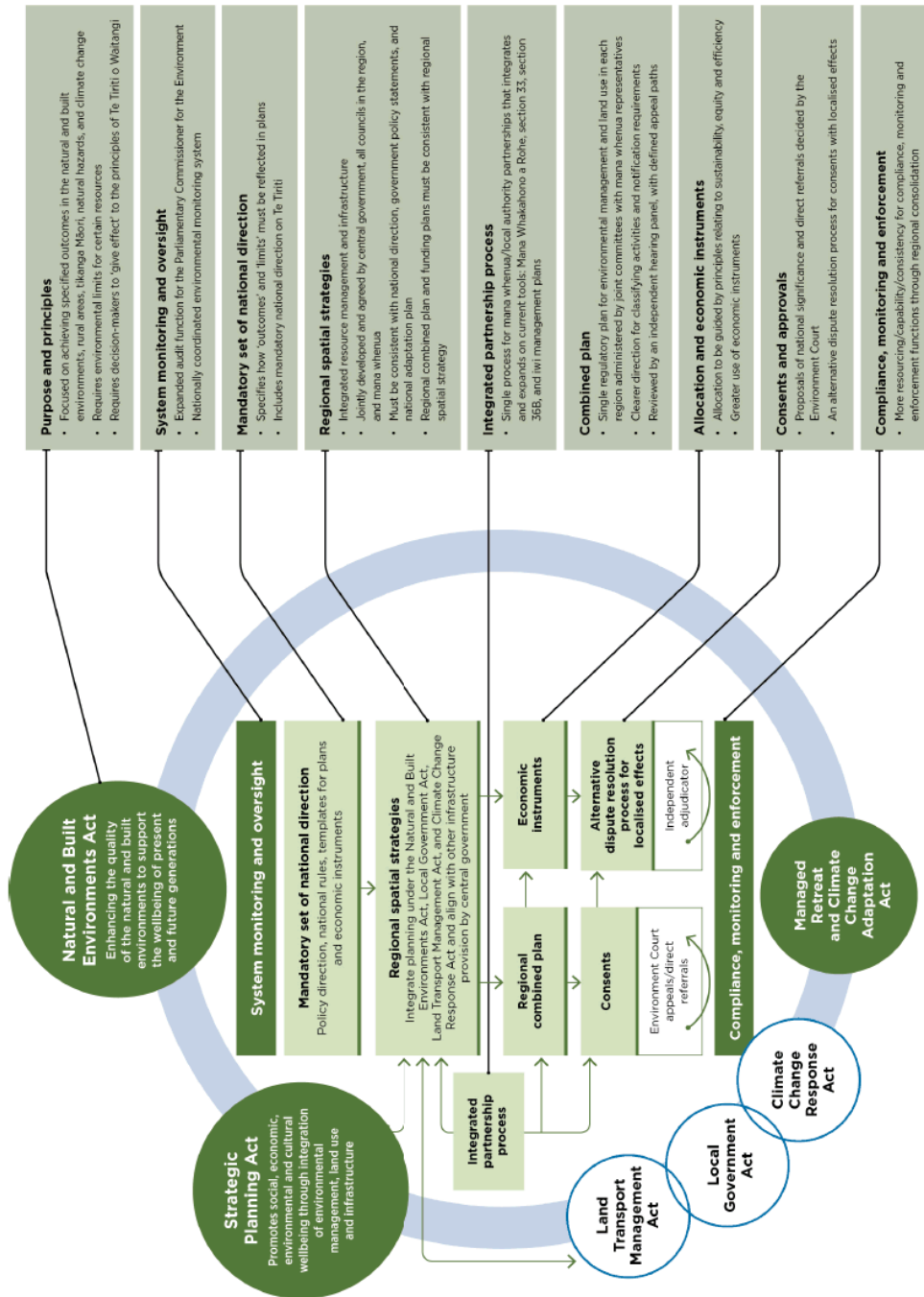
That the Regulatory and Consents Committee:

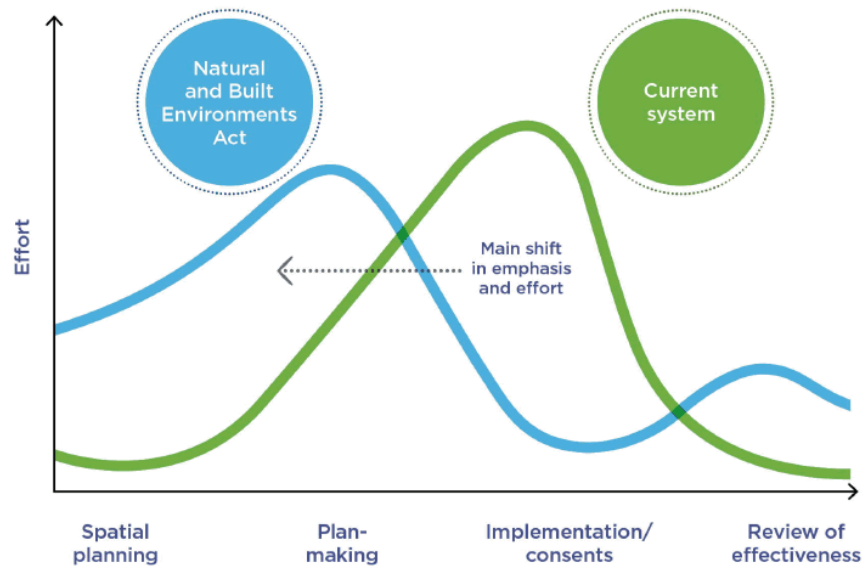
Figure 1: Proposed future environmental management system

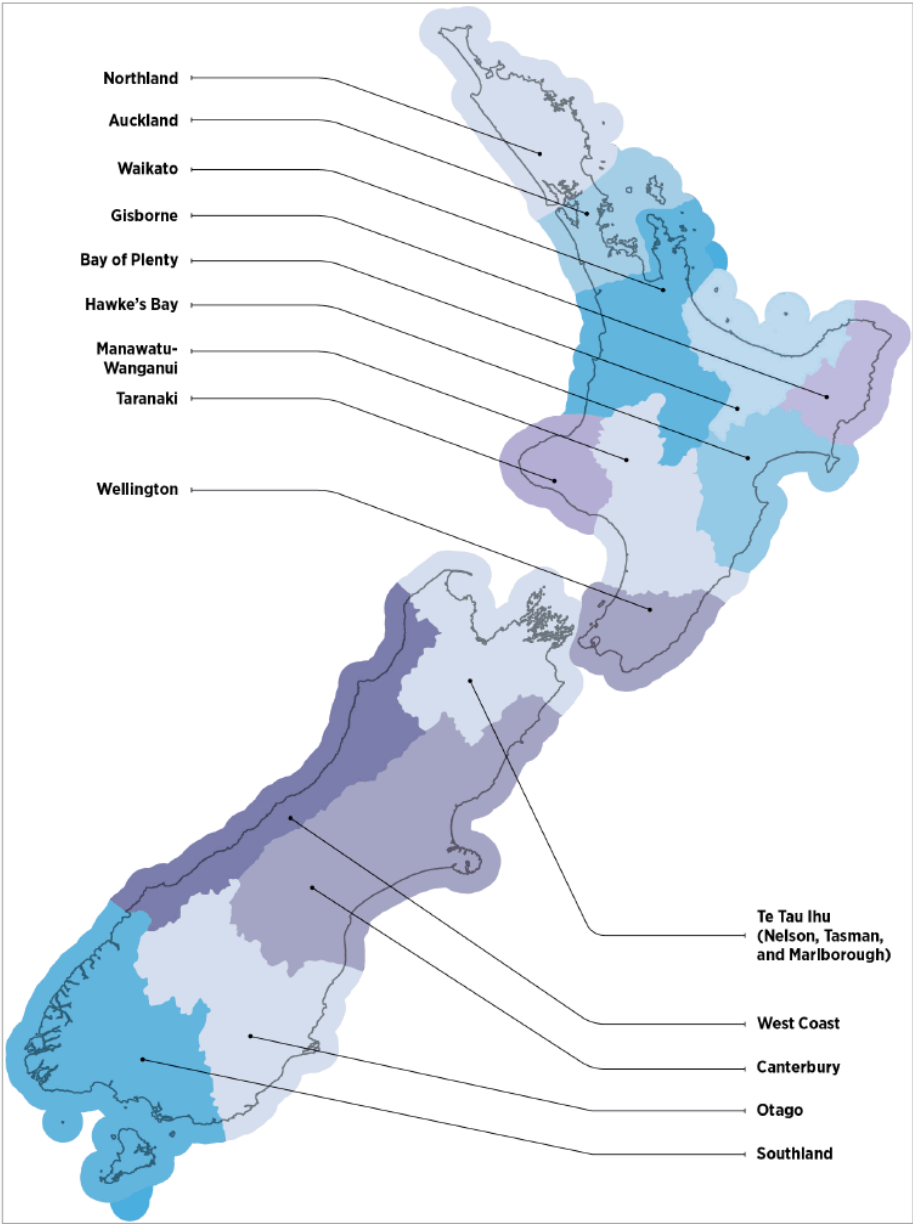
